**EAST POINT GEORGIA MAN, JAMARION ROBINSON
SHOT 76 TIMES BY EIGHT US MARSHALS**

*Evidence Indicates Illegal Entry, Civil Rights Violations, Egregious Over-
Use of Deadly Force and Lack of Probable Cause*

(East Point, Ga.) - On Aug. 5, 2016 seven US Marshals illegally entered the home of Dee White in East Point, Ga. and shot 26-year-old Jamarion Robinson to death. Robinson was killed at 1:30p.m. however the warrant was stamped at 4:30p.m., a full three hours after he was shot to death indicating that the marshals illegally entered Robinson's home. Robinson's mother, Monteria Robinson, stated that when her mother,

Beverly Nixon and her two brothers arrived at the home of Dee White to identify Jamarion Robinson's body, the US marshals presented, as probably cause for entering the home, a picture of the man they claimed pointed a gun at police. What is clear is the man in the photograph was not Jamarion Robinson.

Robinson was a 26-year-old former student-athlete at Clark Atlanta University and was currently attending Tuskegee University where he majored in Biology and played football. Jamarion would have been completing his final semester at Tuskegee that August 2016. Robinson had no history of any violent crimes, nor was he a convicted felon. Police were also aware that Robinson had recently been diagnosed with paranoid schizophrenia. With full knowledge of his condition, and knowing the sensitive nature of the intended arrest, US marshals made no efforts to seek assistance from a mental health professional or a family member.

During the marshal's entering the home, more than 90 shots were fired at Robinson resulting in seventy-six gunshot wounds and bullet entries to his body. Additionally, two live grenades were thrown at him with one landing on his body. With this extremely excessive use of force there was zero bodycam footage; zero officers have been charged; and one year later the family "Still has no Answers."

By legal definition, this was an extremely excessive use of force by humane standards and legal definition: **The Use of Excessive Force**- Excessive force refers to force that exceeds what a

police officer reasonably believes is necessary. A police officer may be held liable for using excessive force in an arrest, an investigatory stop, or other seizures.

What is Use of Force, and What is a Use-of-Force Continuum?

Use of force refers to the amount of effort required by police to compel compliance by an unwilling subject. The Fourth Amendment forbids unreasonable searches and seizures, and various other legal and policy controls govern how and when officers can use force.

A police officer's successful use of deadly force constitutes a seizure within the meaning of the Fourth Amendment, and therefore it must be reasonable. The fact-specific nature of whether an officer's use of force is unreasonable or excessive depends on a totality of the circumstances surrounding the encounter. (<https://www.nij.gov>)

In Robinson's case, there were no evident or reported circumstances that would justify almost 100 shots being fired by eight US marshals and two grenades being launched at one man.

What's more is that Medical Examiner Michele T. Stauffenberg, MD listed the manner of death as a homicide. Postmortem imaging studies containing 27 x-rays was obtained at various stages of Jamarion Robinson's autopsy of the head, chest,

abdomen and upper extremities which revealed 42 projectiles still inside Robinson's body.

The autopsy report for Robinson identified 76 gunshot wounds to almost every part of his body. The report detailed the following gunshot wounds:

- **Gunshot wound #1-** A $5/8 \times 5/8$ " gunshot entrance wound is on the right chest.
- **Gunshot wound #2-** A $1/2 \times 1/2$ " gunshot entrance wound is on the anterior right chest.
- **Gunshot wound #3-** A $1/2 \times 3/8$ " gunshot entrance wound is on the anterior right chest.
- **Gunshot wound #4-** A $5/8 \times 1/2$ " gunshot entrance wound is on the right abdomen.
- **Gunshot wound #5-** A $5/8 \times 1/2$ " gunshot entrance wound is on the right hip.
- **Gunshot wound #6-** A $1/2 \times 3/8$ " irregular gunshot wound is on the right lower abdomen.
- **Gunshot wound #7-** A $1/4 \times 1/4$ " gunshot entrance wound is on the right hip.
- **Gunshot wound #8-** A $1/2 \times 3/8$ " gunshot entrance wound is on the right lateral hip.
- **Gunshot wound #9-** A $1/2 \times 3/8$ " irregular gunshot wound is on the lateral right hip.
- **Gunshot wound #10-** A $5/8 \times 1/2$ " gunshot entrance wound is on the left lateral torso.

- **Gunshot wound #11-** A $1/2 \times 1/2$ " irregular gunshot wound is on the posterior surface of the right upper arm.
- **Gunshot wound #12-** A $1 \times 7/8$ " irregular gunshot wound is on the anterior lateral surface of the right forearm.
- **Gunshot wound #13-** A $3/8 \times 3/8$ " gunshot interest wound is on the posterior surface of the right forearm.
- **Gunshot wound #14-** A $1/2 \times 1/2$ " gunshot interest loan is on an anterior surface of the right hand at the base of the thumb.
- **Gunshot wound #15-** A $3/4 \times 3/4$ " stellate gunshot wound is on the posterior medial surface of the right wrist.
- **Gunshot wound #16-** A $1/4 \times 1/4$ " gunshot wound is on the posterior surface of the left hand near the wrist.
- **Gunshot wound #17-** A $2 - 1/2 \times 1 - 1/2$ " irregular gunshot wound is on the posterior surface of the right hand.
- **Gunshot wound #18-** A $1 \times 3/4$ " irregular gunshot wound is on the lateral surface of the left upper arm.
- **Gunshot wound #19-** A $5/8 \times 1/4$ " a regular gunshot wound is on the anterior lateral surface of the left upper arm.
- **Gunshot wound #20-** A $1/2 \times 3/8$ " gunshot entrance wound is on the anterior medial surface of the left upper arm.
- **Gunshot wound #21-** A long, multi-part graze gunshot wound is on the anterior surface of the left forearm measuring a total of $5 - 1/2 \times 1/2$ " and consisting of several individual braids wounds in a linear configuration.

- **Gunshot wound #22-** A 3× 1-1/2" irregular gunshot wound is on an anterior left wrist.
- **Gunshot wound #23-** A 3/4 × 3\4" irregular gunshot wound is on the posterior surface of the left forearm.
- **Gunshot wound #24-** A 3× 1/2" graze wound is on the posterior surface of the left thumb.
- **Gunshot wound #25-** A 3/8 × 1/4" gunshot wound is on the medial surface of the left wrist.
- **Gunshot wound #26-** A 1/2" slit-like moon is on the anterior surface of the left palm.
- **Gunshot wound #27-** A 1/4× 1/4" gunshot entrance wound is on the posterior surface of the left hand.
- **Gunshot wound #28-** A 1/2× 1/4" slit-like gunshot wound is on the posterior medial surface of the left hand.
- **Gunshot wound #29-** A 3/4× 3/8" lacerated gunshot wound is on the anterior surface of the left hand at the wrist.
- **Gunshot wound #30-** A 1- 1/4× 5/8" irregular gunshot wound is on the anterior right thigh.
- **Gunshot wound #31-** A 1/4 × 1/4" gunshot interest room is on the anterior medial right thigh.
- **Gunshot wound #32-** A 1-1/4 × 1-1/4" irregular gunshot wound is on the anterior medial right thigh.
- **Gunshot wound #33-** A 5/8 × 5/8" irregular gunshot wound is on the anterior right thigh just above the knee.
- **Gunshot wound #34-** A 2-1/4× 2" irregular gunshot wound is on the anterior right thigh above the knee.

- **Gunshot wound #35-** A 1/2×1/2" circular gunshot wound is on the anterior surface of the right leg at the knee.
- **Gunshot wound #36-** A 1/2× 1/2" gunshot entrance wound is on the medial surface of the right leg at the knee.
- **Gunshot wound #37-** A 1/4× 1/4" circular gunshot wound is on the anterior right lower leg.
- **Gunshot wound #38-** A 1/2× 1/2" gunshot interest wound is on the anterior surface of the right lower leg overlying fracture of the tibia.
- **Gunshot wound #39-** A 1/2× 1/2" gunshot entrance wound is on the anterior surface of the right lower leg.
- **Gunshot wound #40-** A 3/8× 3/8" gunshot entrance wound is on the anterior surface of the right ankle.
- **Gunshot wound #41-** A 3/8× 3/8" gunshot interest moon is on the lateral surface of the right lower leg.
- **Gunshot wound #42-** A 1/2× 3/8" gunshot interest wound is on the lateral surface of the right thigh.
- **Gunshot wound #43-** A 1/2× 3/8" gunshot entrance wound is on the lateral surface of the right thigh.
- **Gunshot wound #44-** A 5/8× 1/2" gunshot entrance wound is on the lateral surface of the right thigh.
- **Gunshot wound #45-** A 1/2× 1/2" gunshot entrance wound is on the lateral surface of the right thigh.
- **Gunshot wound #46-** A 5/8× 1/2" atypical gunshot entrance wound is on the lateral surface of the right thigh.
- **Gunshot wound #47-** A 1-1/4× 1" irregular gunshot wound is on a posterior right lower leg.

- **Gunshot wound #48-** A 1×3/4" irregular gunshot wound is on the posterior surface of the right lower leg.
- **Gunshot wound #49-** A 3/8" slit-like gunshot wound is horizontally oriented on the posterior surface of the right lower leg.
- **Gunshot wound #50-**A 1-1/4× 1/2" lacerated wound is on the medial surface of the right thigh near the groin.
- **Gunshot wound #51-** A 1× 5/8" irregular gunshot wound is in the left inguinal area adjacent to the margin of the pubic hair.
- **Gunshot wound #52-** A 1-1/2× 1" irregular gunshot wound is at the base of the penis on the left side.
- **Gunshot wound #53-**A 1/2× 3/8" gunshot entrance wound is on the anterior medial left thigh.
- **Gunshot wound #54-**A 1/2× 1/2" irregular gunshot wound is on the anterior surface of the left thigh.
- **Gunshot wound #55-**A 1/2× 1/2" circular gunshot wound is on the proximal medial surface of the left thigh.
- **Gunshot wound #56-**A 1/2 × 1/2" gunshot wound is on the lateral surface of the left thigh.
- **Gunshot wound #57-**A 1/2× 1/2" gunshot wound is on the lateral left thigh.
- **Gunshot wound #58-**A 5/8× 5/8" gunshot wound is on the lateral surface of the left thigh.
- **Gunshot wound #59-**A 5/8× 1/2" gunshot entrance wound is on the anterior surface of the left thigh.
- **Gunshot wound #60-**A 5/8× 1/2" gunshot entrance wound is on the anterior surface of the left thigh.

- **Gunshot wound #61**-A $1/2 \times 1/2$ " gunshot entrance wound is on the anterior lateral surface of the left thigh just above the knee.
- **Gunshot wound #62**-A $5/8 \times 1/2$ " gunshot entrance wound is on the lateral surface of the left leg at the knee.
- **Gunshot wound #63**- A $5/8 \times 5/8$ " gunshot wound is on the posterior surface of the left lower leg near the popliteal fossa.
- **Gunshot wound #64**-A $1 \times 3/4$ " gunshot wound is on the posterior surface of the left side just below the gluteal crease.
- **Gunshot wound #65**-A $1/2 \times 1/2$ " gunshot entrance wound is on an anterior medial surface at the left lower leg.
- **Gunshot wound #66**-A $5/8 \times 5/8$ " gunshot entrance wound is on the anterior surface of the left lower leg.
- **Gunshot wound #67**-A $1 \times 1/2$ lacerated wound is on the dorsolateral surface of the left foot overlying a fracture.
- **Gunshot wound #68**- irregular gunshot wound is on the posterior right thigh just below the gluteal on crease.
- **Gunshot wound #69**-A $1 \times 5/8$ " gunshot wound is on the posterior left thigh.
- **Gunshot wound #70**-A $5/8 \times 1/2$ " irregular gunshot wound is on the posterior right thigh.
- **Gunshot wound #71**-A $5/8 \times 5/8$ " gunshot wound is on the posterior right thigh.
- **Gunshot wound #72**-A $1/2 \times 5/8$ " gunshot entrance wound is on the posterior surface of the right thigh.

- **Gunshot wound #73**-A 3/4× 3/8" gunshot wound is on the posterior surface of the right thoracic chest.
- **Gunshot wound #74**-A 5/8× 5/8" gunshot wound is on the lower thoracic back.
- **Gunshot wound #75**-A 3/4× 1/2" curved, lacerated gunshot wound is on the left lower thoracic back.
- **Gunshot wound #76**-A 1-1/2× 1" lacerated wound is on the medial surface of the right thigh adjacent to the anus.

Summary of Findings:

Manner of Death- Homicide

Cause of Death- Multiple gunshot wounds of torso and upper and lower extremities.

- Numerous perforating and penetrating gunshot wounds of the upper torso and all four extremities.
- Numerous entrances on all surfaces.
- Damage to both lungs, liver, spleen, small and large bowel, mesentery, bladder, testes, numerous bones.
- Numerous exits on various surfaces of the body.
- Recovery of 42 bullets.

Internal Injuries: Numerous gunshot tracks passed through the body and caused severe damage to several of the internal organs. At least one track, and probably several tracks, passing through the liver resulting in extensive morcellation of the organ. The spleen is similarly damaged. Four holes were in the dome of the bladder and these are surrounded by soft tissue hemorrhage. Multiple perforations are in the small bowel, the large bowel, and the associated mesentery. Two defects are in

the lower lobe of the right lung and a lower lobe of the left lung has a contusion. Hemorrhage surrounds both testes and their capsules are disrupted. Numerous bone fractures are seen by direct examination and by x-ray including the right rib 7 and 8 the left distal humerus, the left proximal ulna, the right distal ulna, the pelvis, the right femur, the right tibia and fibula, the left distal radius, the left 4th metacarpal, the left femur, the left tibia and fibula, and an unspecified fracture in the left foot.

Additional Injuries:

1. A 1/4× 1/8" abrasion is on the right jawline at the angle of the jaw.
2. A 5×2-3/4" cluster of abrasions is on the center of the chest, slightly right of center.
3. A 5/8× 1/2" abrasion is on the anterior lateral right hip.
4. A 2-1/2× 1-1/2" abrasion is on the left abdomen.
5. A 1-1/4× 1/4" obliquely-oriented, linear abrasion is on the anterior right thigh oriented in a 1 to 7 o'clock direction.
6. A 1-1/2× 1/2" abrasion is on the posterior right thigh in the midst of several gunshot wounds.

Georgia State Law: GA 3.02.10 "A person is justified in threatening or using force against another person when, and to the extent that, he/she reasonably believes that such threat or force is necessary to defend himself/herself or a third person against the others imminent use of unlawful force. A person is justified in using force that is intended or likely to cause death or great bodily harm only if that person reasonably believes

that such force is necessary to prevent death or great bodily injury to himself/herself or a third person or to prevent the commission of a forcible felony.”

Georgia officially adopted a “stand your ground law” in 2006, expanding upon the self-defense rights the courts have upheld for years. These laws give Georgia residents the right to literally stand their ground instead of retreating in the face of imminent danger. Georgia's Supreme Court has written there is “NO REQUIREMENT that a victim of an attack first try to escape before using deadly force to stop an aggressor.”

A whole year has past and this family still has no answers as to why Jamarion Robinson’s was murdered. As the family pushes for any of the individual’s responsible be charged accordingly.

What we do know are the following:

- The person in question was not Jamarion Robinson.
- The warrant that was signed for them to legally enter his residence was signed and stamped after he was already deceased. His time of death was 1:30pm yet the warrant was not issued until 4:30pm.
- US Marshals shot at Jamarion over 90 times in with 76 of those shots entering his body.
- After being killed Robinson’s lifeless body was still handcuffed and dragged down the steps.
- In addition to over 90 gunshots, two flash bang grenades were thrown on Jamarion's body.

- An expert recovered bullets that were extracted from inside the floor directly in the location where Jamarion laid, which indicates that the shooter stood directly over Robinson and fired straight down into his body.
- Jamarion had no history of any violent crimes, nor was he a convicted felon.

We live in a society that is taking our children at an alarming rate. The people that are trained to protect and serve can abuse their power and privileges because they are able to hide behind a badge. Law enforcement officers swear an oath of office to uphold the Constitution which states: "On my honor, I will never betray my badge, my integrity, my character or the public's trust. I will always have the courage to hold myself and others accountable for our actions." Who is being held accountable for Jamarion Robinson's murder?
